

The Baldwin Family Village, a program of Dumas Wesley Community Center, provides transitional housing and supportive services to women and children experiencing homelessness. Residents receive safe housing, case management, counseling, employment support, parenting education, and financial literacy training designed to help families achieve long-term stability and permanent housing.



226 women and children served



7-8 months average length of stay





90% of program participants graduated into permanent housing






\$3.6 million in cumulative community savings through reduced costs associated with homelessness and increased family stability

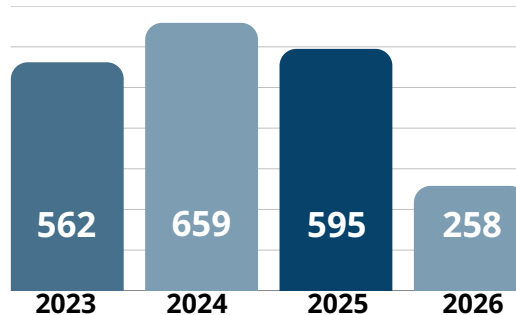
Services Provided

-  **27,108** bednights

-  **260** life skills classes totaling **2,195** hours

Resident Outcomes

-  **100%** improved their credit scores
-  **43%** secured better employment
-  **19** obtained reliable transportation

Housing Crisis Calls Received



136 children resided in shelter with their moms



94 school-age children attended Baldwin County schools



12 children reunited with moms after housing stability was obtained by head of household

Causes of Homelessness

- 48%** eviction due to job loss or financial insecurity
- 40%** fleeing domestic violence
- 7%** substance abuse disorder
- 4%** living in a place not fit for human habitation
- 1%** medical crisis
